

Embracing Ash Wednesday: A Spiritual Journey of Reflection and Renewal

Planning for our next Heartland Youth gathering, we called Heartland Camp and asked if there was any way we could be of service to them. The answer? Help show some TLC to the Ellis Cemetery, a historic cemetery located on camp property! Originally part of the Ellis family farm, the land became a graveyard with the first burial there in 1863. 121 people are recorded to have been buried there, continuing until 1972. As the property changed hands, so did the responsibility to caretake the cemetery.

Today, the land belongs to Heartland Camp. They have maintained the cemetery through the years, but it is a heavily wooded and somewhat remote area, and has become overgrown. We're going to visit and do what we can to help restore this sacred space. Save the date!
